

As we head into a new year as a church, there are a few things to bring to your attention. First, you are invited on a Lenten Journey together. Throughout the season of Lent, starting February 13/14, some of us will gather to learn how we build beloved community in the United Church of Canada. Will you join us? The details are in this newsletter. Tuesday nights will be on Zoom and Wednesday mornings (weather permitting of course!) will be in the Quiet Room at the church. Please sign up with the office and obtain a copy of the book we will use.

But before Lent begins we are also offering a series of scriptural healing explorations on Sunday mornings. A four-part preaching series with guest speakers, January 21 will be me (Rev. Wanda) speaking on spiritual healing. January 28 Frank Blanchet will speak on mental health, and on February 4 Pastor Ian Robb will speak on physical healing and the gift of life. Please note these aren't the kind of services where we will actually do healing... this is a time to wonder about the power of God as revealed in the Bible and in our lives, and explore all the ways God has offered healing in our lives.

Then finally, on Transfiguration Sunday, we will explore how we ourselves have been transformed and enlivened by the presence and healing of Spirit.

In the meantime, Bible Study resumes on Wednesday mornings (new members always welcome!) and all our committees are meeting, carrying on the ministry of Jesus Christ here in Brighton. If you are wondering how you can be involved, just message me or the office and we can talk about how God is calling you to ministry at Trinity-St. Andrew's United in Brighton.

Body, Mind and Spirit

The Advent candles burned for the last time on December 24th. The Christmas gifts have long ago been unwrapped and integrated into our lives. The last of the fruit cake and turkey will be swelling our waistlines and life will be returning to normal, whatever that may mean to you. The Christmas season is a worldwide celebration which survives in part because of religious belief and also because it

is now a serious factor in the economy. Billions in currency is exchanged for manufactured goods, stimulating industries, increasing demand for raw materials and in the process, contributing to the waste and pollution problems of the world.

In a sermon which I preached a few years ago in a PEC Bloomfield church on Sunday 31st. December I said these words: "Is this what Christmas should be about? Has it been hijacked by the retail industry as an excuse for a shopping spree, or is Christmas about something deeper and more profound?"

I fear that we have enough problems in the Church today trying to encourage the public to consider and nurture their Spiritual selves without actively promoting a reduction of consumption which, if successful, would mean fewer jobs, localized poverty and possibly recession, or at best a flat line economy. (Ironic, isn't it!) Pursuing this area of thought helps us to understand just how difficult it is to effect beneficial change in society. There is absolutely incontrovertible evidence that by far the greatest problem facing the peoples of the world today, and in particular the developed nations, is how to discontinue (limit) growth in favour of sustainability.

I well recall one day in our home, several decades ago that our then, 5 year old daughter Jacqui was playing rather near to a guarded fireplace. Her mom told her: "Jacqui, don't touch the fireguard as it is hot and it will burn you." The little one moved away for a short while and then, when our backs were turned, came a yell of pain and fright mixed with tears, and a little hand was being frantically waved about. Quick attention by 'nurse' mom and the damage was repaired much to the chagrin of our previously recalcitrant daughter. The moral of the story is that humanity has a propensity to ignore warnings until serious damage occurs. Only then is alternative behavior considered.

2024 has begun its leap year journey through 366 days, and I for one would like that journey to be a positive one, not only for Pastor Ian, but for TSAUC and all of our friends and family. For that to happen we all need to play our part in trying to do as many of the right things that are beneficial to our lives. #3 on my list is to take care of our physical selves through right diet and right exercise. #2 on my list, and perhaps the most difficult of all because it can affect the other two is to take care of our Minds (attitude) #1 on my list wish as you might expect from a pastor, is to take care of our Spiritual selves using the help that is available through appropriate people and organizations.

These three make up Body, Mind and Spirit. Care for them all friends; they are who and what we are.

Spiritual Direction

Some of you may be aware that for the past 2 and a half years I have been training to become a spiritual director. Well, on December 1 I handed in my final assignment and soon should receive my certificate in the mail. I have created a website for this particular practice, so please have a look

at www.wandastride.ca, and if you have any questions at all, don't hesitate to reach out.

There is a possibility some of you don't know what spiritual direction is. It's a lot of things, but my working understanding is that it is a time when you get to share your life story with someone who will listen, really listen.

Someone who will follow the threads you don't even know you are weaving, wonder about them with you, and watch as you discover deep truth about yourself and how you see the world.

If you are a person of faith there is another way of saying this; in our time together we will discover how God is working in your life, how you have been understanding the spirit's activity and how this shapes your identity. Who is God calling you to be?

Every session is different and every person approaches spiritual direction for different reasons. Sometimes it is to understand your faith better.

Sometimes it is to seek help making a difficult decision. Sometimes people just have an inner yearning they can't explain, a restlessness, and want to understand it better.

Sessions are free to members of the church, but I also encourage you to consider making a non-tax-receiptable donation to the church to mark our time together, as a way of distinguishing it from regular church activities. You Too?

The child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "...a sword will pierce your own soul too." – Luke 2:33-35 (NRSV abridged)

Simeon is the most obvious of prophets. Not like, oh Simeon, you're so brilliant, you're obviously a prophet! But like, duh, Simeon, it didn't take a prophet to see that coming!

Telling a new parent that loving this little bundle of joy is also going to destroy them? Telling someone who has just given birth that for every hope she holds, there will also be pain?

She's figured it out. Jesus is eight days old now. You can already see the sword handle sticking out of her chest. That's what it means to be a loving parent.

That's what it means to be a loving anything: friend, child, neighbor. Caring for this other person will be a sign of life, and liberation, and joy. And it will also just about kill you. Every. Single. Day.

That's the way I've read Simeon's "too" in "a sword will pierce your soul too." There will be joy and pain as well. You take the good with the bad. #factsoflife

But there is another, less obvious, way. Simeon is, after all, a prophet. Maybe these are God's words. Maybe that "too" is God's too. Maybe God is telling Mary, "We are in this together." And in that moment, God means it more than ever. Because, in Jesus, God finally has a soul to be pierced.

Jesus is eight days old. God already knows: this hurts. Maybe God is telling Mary, telling us, I get it now. I've loved like you. See the sword?

Save the date, Sunday February 11 after church for a pancake breakfast and a chance to make a Mardi Gras mask. All events are by free will offering.


Lenten Candles





Affirm Terminology for January

Last month, we featured pronouns and the fact that many people use pronouns after their name. This month, we explore how to use pronouns.

When someone shares their pronouns, it is an indication of how they would like to be referred to in the third person. Most people think of pronouns as they fall within the

gender binary – with men using he/him/his and women using she/her/hers. However, gender neutral pronouns such as they, ze, xe and others exist and are often used by non-binary people, who do not associate themselves with genders of man or woman.

Gender neutral pronouns are also useful if someone doesn't know the gender of the person they are speaking about ("The pizza delivery person is at the door, give them a good tip!"). Some people give options when sharing their pronouns. For example, a non-binary person could use both "he/him/his" and "they/them/theirs" pronouns. Questions or suggestions? This new petition calls upon the Government of Canada to implement the recommendations from the White Paper on the Status of Trans and Gender Diverse People.

Stewardship News

Envelopes: In the past few years we have noticed that the number of offering envelopes coming back to the church are fewer than the numbers we print. We have decided therefore to cut back on the number of envelopes that each person envelope user receives in order to both reduce our costs and our environmental impact. You will receive your envelopes with your "envelope no." on each one. If you run out of envelopes please see Pamela and she will provide you with more. This is also a good time to consider migrating to pre-authorized remittance (PAR) which allows both you and the church to better budget on a monthly basis. For more information about PAR, please speak to Pamela in the office.

Matching donation: The church received a large donation near the end of 2023, which helped reduce our deficit. Your Stewardship team, with the permission of the donor, is asking the congregation collectively to match this \$23,000 donation. In the hall envelopes with specific donation suggestions printed on them will be available starting on January 14th. Please prayerfully consider if you are able to make a one time donation to help match this generous donation and take an envelope which best matches the amount you are able to assist with. One donor helped mitigate the 2023 deficit - the whole congregation can help start 2024 off on the right foot.



Vulnerability of LGBTQI+ Refugees
Held every four years, the Global Refugee Forum is the world's largest international gathering on refugees, and recently met in Geneva. The Forum recognizes the current urgency of the global crisis of LGBTQIA+ forced displacement because of homophobia, transphobia, discrimination, violence, and persecution.

The **United Church of Canada** was one of more than 75 organizations that signed [a statement](#) drafted by allied or-

ganizations. The statement calls on countries without punitive impacts for people who are LGBTQIA+ (allied countries) to create more dedicated pathways and programs to help LGBTQI+ people who are at risk of persecution, through funding for essential services and accessible resettlement pathways.

Main Entrée - \$7.00, Soup/Dessert - \$3.00 and Breakfast Snack - \$3.00. Frozen Meals On Wheels are ordered twice a month on the 2nd and the 4th Wednesday of the month and delivered the following week.
