Dear family in Christ

It seems like months have gone by since we gathered at the shore of Lake Ontario to welcome the Risen Christ into our lives! Since we baptized, confirmed and welcomed new members into our faith family... and yet it's only been a little over a week!

Thankfully, the season of Easter lasts longer than one intense weekend. We come through the uncomfortable surrender to the foot-washer, the anguish of the arrest and execution of a beloved friend, the confusion of the empty tomb of Easter morning, and we arrive at a month-long feast celebrating the risen Christ with us. Fifty days of Easter before we reach Pentecost on June 8.

So what does this mean for you? I'm reading Steve Bell's series of reflections on the Christian calendar, called "Pilgrim Year", and I'm reminded of how powerful hope is. I know there are a few reading this message who are unable to stand in the sunshine of Easter morning, because of the power of Good Friday is looming in your life... worry about a loved one, death, terrible loss, guilt. And I get it. Sometimes our own realities are simply too real, large, and they block out the sunshine. Everything but the pain feels false and empty.

Does that sound familiar? The thing is, that's not true. Being overshadowed by pain and suffering is real, but what would it feel like to place that suffering in the context of the One who arose on that third morning? The One who joined his disciples on the road to Emmaus, who seemed a stranger in the weight of their grief... but do you know when they felt their hearts lighten? As they broke bread together.

Jesus enters our lives in very ordinary ways, like sitting at the table and sharing a loaf of bread. Like taking a walk along the lakeshore with friends. Like gathering for a church supper and looking neighbours in the eye as you share a feast and a conversation.

I know it can be overwhelming when the world around you gets excited about returning birds and warm breezes, and your own heart is so heavy you can barely lift yourself out of bed in the morning. But Jesus is there with you. You aren't alone.

In this month long feast, let's figure out ways to make space for the risen Christ. Let's figure out ways to give hope a chance. Let's share a feast together, even if it's just toast and jam. Because Jesus meets us in the calm of the Easter Feast, and is inviting you into his trust.

Week Seventeen: Celebrating Resurrection

Wednesday, April 23, 2025

Death into Life

Sisters and brothers, especially those of you experiencing pain and sorrow, your silent cry has been heard and your tears have been counted; not one of them has been lost!... The resurrection of Jesus is indeed the basis of our hope. For in the light of this event, hope is no longer an illusion.... That hope is not an evasion, but a challenge; it does not delude, but empowers us.

—Pope Francis (1936–2025), "Urbi Et Orbi," Easter, 2025

Father Richard shares how we can receive the miracle of new life by embracing our own difficulties and "deaths" as Jesus did.

Death is not only physical dying. Death also means going to the full depths of things, hitting the bottom, going beyond where we're in control. In that sense, we all go through many deaths in our lives, tipping points when we have to ask, "What am I going to do?" Many people turn bitter, look for someone to blame, and close down. Their "death" is indeed death for them because there is no room for growth after that. But when we go into the full depths and death of anything—even, ironically, the depths of our own sin—we can come out the other side transformed, more alive, more open, more forgiving of ourselves and others. And when we come out the other side, we know that we've been led there. We're not holding on; we're being held by a larger force, by a larger source that is not our own. That's what it means to be saved! It means that we've walked through the mystery of transformation.

The miracle of it all—if we are to speak of miracles—is that God has found the most ingenious way to transform the human soul. God uses the very thing that would normally destroy us—the tragic, the sorrowful, the painful, the unjust deaths that lead us all to the bottom of our lives—to transform us. There it is, in one sentence. Are we prepared to trust that?

Jesus' death and resurrection is a statement of how reality works all the time and everywhere. He teaches us that there's a different way to live with our pain, our sadness, and our suffering. We can say, "Woe is me," and feel sorry for ourselves, or we can say, "God is even in this."

None of us crosses over this gap from death to new life by our own effort, our own merit, our own purity, or our own perfection. Each of us—from pope to president, from princess to peasant—is carried across by unearned grace. Worthiness is never the ticket, only deep desire. With that desire the tomb is always, finally empty, as Mary Magdalene discovered on Easter morning. Death cannot win. We're finally indestructible when we recognize that the thing which could destroy us is the very thing that could enlighten us.

Friends, the Easter feast is a reminder to all of us to open our eyes and our ears and to witness what is happening all around us, all the time, everywhere. God's one and only job description is to turn death into life. That's what God does with every new spring-time, every new life, every new season, every new anything. God is the one who always turns death into life, and no one who trusts in this God will ever be put to shame (Psalm 25:3).



Jesus said, "Wisdom is proved right by all her children." – Luke 7:35 (NIV)

Have you ever heard the Naija saying, "Wisdom is chasing you, but you are faster"? It's a startling image—wisdom running after us, blessings right on our heels, while we race ahead, too distracted or stubborn to slow down and receive them.

In Luke 7, Jesus grows frustrated with how much we miss the gifts God is offering. The people were scandalized by him, rejecting the healing right in front of them because it didn't fit their expectations. They tripped over their own assumptions, outrunning the wisdom of his truth.

Have you ever outrun your blessing? Wisdom was chasing you, but you were faster. The healing you needed was offered, but you resisted.

So what do you do when you find yourself running? You stop. Running from your blessing is exhausting. It puts distance between you and the healing you need. And that healing? It often requires a correction. We call that confession.

Confession is the act of stopping. It's when we quit running long enough to admit what's got us tangled.

Here's the good news: Try as you might, you'll never outrun God. God is behind you, but God is also before you. God is even within you.

You will never outrun God. Stop. Just for a moment. And watch what God will do.

Prayer

God of wisdom and grace, I confess that I have been running—from truth, from healing, from you. Help me to stop. Help me to trust. Help me to receive the blessing that is right here, right now. Amen.





Assemble on the church's rainbow steps at 9:45 a.m. We will provide flags and sticks with colourful streamers. The Walk will go rain or shine!



The Affirm and Equity Committee is excited to announce that we are collaborating with others in the community to make this year's Pride events better than ever. For starters, a local trans youth, Ryan Keenan, designed our beautiful and colourful Pride Walk and Worship Service poster. The poster features the United Church of Canada's 100th anniversary logo, TSA's dove logo and the Municipality of Brighton's logo with the words "proudly supported by the Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Committee" (JEDI). We are grateful for their ongoing support.

We have also received an offer of support from a local business. Dr. Andrea Wernham and her team at the Presqu'ile Animal Hospital, located in the mall just north of Trinity-St. Andrew's, have offered to create Pride keychains, bookmarks and headbands for our give-away table at the Pride Worship Service. In the face of so many anti-LGBTQ movements throughout the world, it is inspiring to witness the increasing interest and momentum that local Pride groups are experiencing and the many joint celebrations that demonstrate Brighton's Pride and support for LGBTQ+ people.

Trinity-St. Andrew's Clothing Depot 58 Prince Edward St.


